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YFC Show and Tell

The October YFC meeting was a "show and tell" by members describing a variety of fishing and tackle making techniques. I circuited the room and got bits and pieces of every ones presentations. I didn't get it all, but here is what I learned.

Jim Kloth demonstrated how to make spinner rigs for walleye trolling with crawlers. Jim starts with a fluorocarbon leader 6 to 8 feet long. He uses a variety of leader strengths from 4 to 14 pound test. He also found a nice item at Walmart for storing leader material. The leader should be shorter than the trolling rod you are using. On the end of the leader he snells on a treble hook. An important techniques is to learn to tie the snell knot. If he feels ambitious he will add a drop of fishing glue to make sure the knot is secure. About five inches up from the treble he snells in a single sickle hook. Jim likes sickle hooks for their strength. After that you can add beads, floats, spinner blades, etc. to your hearts content. What ever you think will work. Tie a loop in the other end of the leader and you are finished. Use a piece of round pipe insulation or a swimming pool noodle to wrap the spinner rigs around for storage.

Jesse Tougas demonstrated fly tying. When I watched he was making a Wooly Bugger. If you are a trout fisherman a Wooly Bugger is the fly you would probably choose if you had only one fly you could fish with. It also works for smallmouth bass. I tie small ones (mini-buggers?) for bluegill fishing. There are a variety of options for tying Wooly Buggers so they float or sink. The can imitate an aquatic insect larva, a minnow, or a grasshopper. Later I stopped again and Jesse was doing an egg loop that could be used for stream fishing Great Lakes trout or salmon when they are in rivers. Jesse and Paul Zoch where trying to figure out how to tie a surgeons loop, a handy knot for tying two pieces of leader material together.

Once you have your Wooly Bugger tied you could go visit Gene Wengert. Gene was showing how to fly fish with a spinning outfit. The most important piece equipment here is a casting bubble. A casting bubble is a float, usually clear plastic, that you can add water to change the weight. This allows you to adjust the weight you are casting so you can cast very light flies.

If you are going after larger fish you could stop and see Tom Wilke. He was showing how he modifies larger spoons and plugs for muskies and big pike. Tom also showed some of his fish cutout wall hangings.

Stop bye Duffy's location if you wanted to hear about how and where to use the spoons on Lake Mendota. Some of Duffy's favorite locations are off Fox Bluff. An area from Marshall Park to Pheasant Branch, both sides of Governor's Island, and the east side of Warner Bay-areas with steep drop-offs. For Gator Spoons, Duffy likes gold better than silver for Lake Mendota and keep those spoons just "ticking" the tops of the weeds.

Charlie Grimm is a man of many talents. He demonstrated rod building and jig pouring. You may not want to build your own rod, but the techniques are handy if you ever have to repair a rod. Do you know how to find the spline of rod? You need to know that if you are going to build a rod. The technique for wrapping on guides is similar to what you may have learned in scouts for whipping the end of a rope.

For jig pouring you need a pot to heat the lead, the proper jig hook size, and the molds. Old wheel weights are one source of lead or old lead pipe if you can find it. You use to be able to buy plumbers lead at the hardware store and sporting goods catalogs sell lead for casting bullets. There are also lead substitutes like tin and titanium that some prefer but they are more expensive. A key to casting good jigs is to get the mold hot enough so the lead doesn't cool too fast. This means you usually have to pour some jig heads that don't turn out very well to warm up the mold. No problem, just remelt the lead off the hook. With powder paint, painting jigs has become much more easy and the finish much more durable. Go to Harbor Freight

and buy a heat gun for an easy way to heat the powder paint. The jig eyes are harder to clean out with powder paint so you may want to clean them out before you take the jigs out in the boat.

A number of techniques involve tying knots of various types. Tom Raschke demonstrated knot tying and Eldon Boehm had a tool that helps tying hooks to the line and for making slip-bobber knots. The uni-knot, palomar knot, snell knot, surgeons loop, and whip finish will get you a long ways in the knots you should know for fishing. If you want to "brush-up" on your knot tying go to www.NetKnots.com to learn a variety of fishing, boating, and outdoor knots.


Finally I stopped by Phil James location. Phil was showing a downrigger and line release that he really likes for Great Lakes salmon fishing. The release is called a Chamberlain release and it was invented by a fellow in Vermont for trolling for trout in inland lakes. It can be set to be very sensitive so small fish will trigger the release. You won't be dragging small fish around with out knowing it because the release didn't release. It may also work well for downrigger trolling for walleyes. The Walker downrigger that Phil demonstrated has an adjustable arm so sections can be added or taken out. This allows different arm lengths if you want to use the downrigger off the side of the boat or off the back of the boat.

That about all I learned. If you have any questions just "corner" the appropriate person at the next meeting and get more details.



The rest of early 2013 is as scheduled:


March 16 or 23 Clements' barge on the Mississippi.








YFC Forum Tip



The Warner Park Lagoon

Recently, each summer YFC uses Warner Park Lagoon for Kid's Fishing Day. But the lagoon has a long history of fishing. May be you fished there back in the "old-days"? The lagoon also has a long history of fish surveys carried out by Paul DuVair's, a biology teacher at East High School, aquatic biology classes. In fact there are 49 years of information collected by these classes. Netting fish occurred in the third week of June, in the same location, using the same type of net since 1964. Jack Hurst shared some of the findings at the October meeting. The "highlights" are as follows:

Nothern pike, once a common resident in the lagoon was last captured as fingerlings in 2001. Muskies were last captured in 1987.

There were no winter fish kills in the lagoon until 1992 when a fish kill nearly destroyed the lagoon's entire fish population (only 16%) survived. Bluegills maintained a fragile dominance. Another fish kill occurred in 1999. The following year gold and silver shiners established dominance. Another fish kill occurred in 2006 and dominance was not established because another fish kill struck in 2008. Black bullheads established dominance in the nearly empty lagoon.

The biology class attributes much of the fish kills to the lagoon becoming shallower, mainly from refuse and storm sewer pollution and runoff.
